

Ambulance Service Communicable Disease Standards

The operator of each ambulance service shall ensure that:

1. Each EMA and Paramedic is immunized against each of the diseases set out in Table 1 - Part A **OR** provides documentation that: such immunization is medically contraindicated, there is laboratory proof of immunity, or there is medically documented history of prior disease (Physician or laboratory documentation for Measles and Hepatitis B, personal history for Chicken Pox), and
2. Ambulance students, prior to commencing any clinical experience within the service, are immunized against each of the diseases set out in Table 1 – Part A, OR have documentation that: such immunization is medically contraindicated, there is laboratory proof of immunity, or there is medically documented history of prior disease (Physician or laboratory documentation for Measles and Hepatitis B, personal history for Chicken Pox), and
3. Each EMA, paramedic and student within the service is free from all communicable diseases set out in Table 1 - Part B.

TABLE 1 - Part A

Mandatory immunization	
Disease	Schedule
Tetanus Diphtheria Poliomyelitis	TD – Polio (2 and 1)
Measles Mumps Rubella	MMR as a single dose
Chickenpox	0 and 1 month
Hepatitis B	0, 1, and 6 months or 0 and 6 months (for product approved for 2 doses)
